Descriptions in the Farrell Collection were written based on personal research and sources including, but not limited to: Articles in the Carriers and Locals Society's The Penny Post; Amos Media's Scott Catalogue; Patton's The Private Local Post of the United States; Springer's Handbook of North American Cinderella Stamps; Lyons' Identifier for Carriers, Locals, Fakes Forgeries and Bogus Posts of the United States; articles in the USPCS's The Chronicle; Mosher's Catalog of Private Express Labels and States; articles in the USPCS's The Chronicle; Mosher's Catalog of Private Express Labels and Stamps; The Eastern Independent Mail Company Study Group's Eastern Independent Mail Companies and Express Mail Companies 1840-1845; Elliot Perry's Pat Paragraphs; James N. Drummond's Catalog of Philatelic Miscellany; and the notes of George Sloane and Gordon Stimmell.

Colors listed for stamps and forgeries are the opinions of the Farrell Collection based on viewing physical copies of the pieces under consistent lighting. Colors in the .pdfs may be slightly inaccurate due to manipulations from the scanning process, computer monitor settings, or (in event that the files are printed for offline viewing) the printing process.

Unless otherwise noted, stamps are identified by their Scott Catalogue numbers and forgeries are identified by their Lyons Identifier type. Scott numbers in parenthesis under listed forgeries represent approximately what stamp the forgery is attempting to imitate.

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In 1844, this local post operated between New York, Albany, and Troy. George Brainard ran the post from the Albany office, with L. Farwell as the agent in Troy. The mail line operated into 1845, delivering mail for 6 cents and selling stamps at twenty for a dollar.

Brainard & Co. delivered using steamboat routes along the Hudson River. When the river was frozen in winter, a detour on the Western Railroad could be used. Brainard & Co. was a close partner with Hale & Co. in Boston, connecting to exchange letters. They also connected with American Letter Mail and other local posts.

This post is sometimes attributed to Charles H. Brainard, a Boston bookseller who operated a shortlived express to New York. Charles's bookstore (Brainard & Co.) and mail line (Brainard's Express) were unrelated to this Brainard & Co. mail line.

The cover above represents a conjunctive use between Brainard & Co. and Hale & Co. The letter, dated March 7, 1845, was mailed with an oval Brainard & Co. Handstamp. This handstamp, and the accompanying Hale & Co. box, are listed in the American Stampless Cover Catalog, Volume 11, on page 9.

Brainard & Co. issued two stamps of the same design, one in black and one in blue.

The cover below was mailed with a black stamp, tied by a pen line cancellation. A red "Forwarded by / Brainard & Co. / Albany" oval handstamp also marks the cover.

Brainard & Co. issued two stamps of the same design, one in black and one in blue. The cover below was paid with a blue stamp, cancelled by pen. In addition to the Brainard & Co. stamp, the cover is marked with "Paid 3" in manuscript and "PAID" in red handstamp. The letter within discusses elections in Pennsylvania.



John Walter Scott produced Brainard & Co. forgeries based on the illustration that he published in his stamp collectors albums. This forgery is identified primarily by the foot of the first "R" in

"BRAINARD", which touches the foot of the "A" that follows it. Scott forgeries are printed in black or shades of blue on white or cream paper of varying thickness.

S. Allan Taylor created two different forgeries of the "Brainard & Co." stamps. The first version can be identified by the breaks in the inner border between "River St." and "Wall St.", and the detached right leg of the "N" in "BRAINARD". His second design has as identifier the detached horizontal middle lines in the letters "B" and "R" of "BRAINARD".

Both designs have printing flaws that only appear on some of the stamps. Most notably on the first forgery are the dotted line behind the "D" of "BRAINARD" and the small dash between "Wall St." And "CO.", which you can see on the stamps of Form BB1. The second forgery has as possible flaws small dots on each side of the "Y" in "N.Y." and a dot between the "R" and "D" of "BRAINARD". You can find these on the stamps of Form 9.






The following forgeries were produced for George Hussey by his engraver, Thomas Wood. According to Wood's records (as published by Elliott Perry) about 3,000 black and 1,000 blue forgeries of the "Brainard & Co." stamps were printed for Hussey before 1866.
