Towle, an employee for Hale & Co., established his own Boston post office, known as "Towle's City Post" or "Towle's City Despatch," around 1846. Although the post changed its name after taking on Cheever as a partner in 1848, advertisements and handstamps continued to use the previous names. Delivering within Boston for 2¢, this post used stamps similar in appearance to Hale & Co.'s.

If a letter is to be mailed, just drop it, with two cents, into Towle & Oo.'s boxes and the trouble is over; you have not to walk a mile or more to drop a letter into the post office; if you have circulars for distribution, Towle & Co. are the men to scatter them, for they pass through every section of the city; If you have errands to be performed these gentlemen have a man ever ready at their office to "run" for a fair compensation. In fact, this City Post establishment is just what will be supported liberally when people learn its advantages. Read the advertisement.


In 1852, the business was purchased by George Barker, who changed the name to Barker's City Post and continued deliveries until 1861.



The cover above was mailed locally to Herman M. Chapin at Long Warf. The stamp used is a pale, chalky blue color. This shade indicates that it was most likely from an early 1848 printing. The "XII" manuscript cancel signified an afternoon delivery time.

The genuine Cheever & Towle stamps were supposedly printed from a plate of twenty. According to rumors, the plate was broken into two plates of ten, only one of which was used to print reprints.

All the reprints have flaws that are unique to the reprints alone, and as such they can be positioned to the plate of ten. A brief guide to most of the constant flaws is presented below.





The flaw shown at left is present on both position 6 and position 2.

POSITION 6 & POSITION 2: BREAK IN ENVELOPE CORNER UNDER "R" OF "FOR"

Reprints from the top row are (positions 1-5) measure about 24.5 mm in diameter, while reprints from the bottom row (positions 6-10) measure about 25 mm.

At some point, the reprint plate changed hands and second reprinting was produced by the new owner. It is widely believed that it was J. W. Scott who acquired the plate. These later reprints can be identified by some changes and additional flaws. In general, most of the flaws from the first reprinting are more pronounced. A few of the most significant changes are shown here.

J. W. Scott used the reprint position eight to illustrate the stamp in his catalogues. He also had a separate die of only position eight that he used to create a number of individual reprints. These were

separate reprints from the plate reprints as evidenced by the large margins on several cuts.

These Scott reprints have additional thick ink flaws on the top and bottom border.



This first forgery of the "Cheever & Towle" stamp was made by George Hussey, and was printed in sheets. Different compositions exist, with smaller and larger margins between the stamps, and also with the rows not directly above each other.

There are various ways to tell Hussey's design apart. The "R" in "FOR" is next to the corner of the envelope left to it, and often has a period underneath it. The "2" in "2 CTS" is squat and pointy, and the "L" in "DELIVERY" has a flaw attaching it to the border of the envelope.

The following four designs are all by unknown forgers, except for the second design, which was made by J. B. Moens.

The first design is easily identified by the "H" in "CHEEVER" looking like a mirrored "N", while the next two designs have replaced the first "E" in "DELIVERY" with an "I". Of these two designs, the latter uses a much finer lettering. The last design on this page has a very curvy "7" in "7 STATE ST".
