J. Staley started the *St. Louis City Delivery* in November of 1882, delivering circulars, letters, and small packages throughout the business district of the city. By January of 1883, his business had become so successful that he opened his second post, this *Cincinnati City Delivery*. Unfortunately, only a few weeks later, the government suppressed both City Deliveries.

Stamps were issued for both posts with identical designs, with only names and addresses changed. About 25,000 stamps were produced for each post. These stamps were printed in sheets of twenty-five, in shades of carmine, and perforated with gauge 11. Of the Cincinnati post, which operated for a shorter period, only about 5,000 of the stamps were sold for usage. After the posts were forced to close, the remainder of the stamps were sold to collectors. Most of these remainders were cancelled before sale, using a purple target handstamp consisting out of two circles.

While the corner stamps can be identified by the imperf sides, there are a few positions that can be plated. Plate wear also appears on several of the stamps, most noticeable in the bottom row stamps, making those identifiable as well.

In 1951, the Society of Philatelic Americans hosted their 57th Annual Convention and Exhibition in Cincinnati, Ohio. To commemorate the occasion, a special souvenir seal was produced that featured a facsimile of the Cincinnati City Delivery stamp. These souvenirs were printed in red and blue ink on white, green, and yellow paper.

The facsimiles are copies of the original stamp. They can be identified by their darker printing, most noticeable on the right side, where the dark scroll reading "CINCINNATI" appears to continue down the side of the design.
