The information and identification within these selections is the individual work of the Farrell Collection. It is always recommended to consult multiple sources for additional information or opinions. Local post company descriptions are based on information available at the time of writing.

Descriptions in the Farrell Collection were written based on personal research and sources including, but not limited to: Articles in the Carriers and Locals Society's The Penny Post; Amos Media's Scott Catalogue; Patton's The Private Local Post of the United States; Springer's Handbook of North American Cinderella Stamps; Lyons' Identifier for Carriers, Locals, Fakes Forgeries and Bogus Posts of the United States; articles in the USPCS's The Chronicle; Mosher's Catalog of Private Express Labels and Stamps; The Eastern Independent Mail Companies and Express Mail Companies 1840-1845; Elliot Perry's Pat Paragraphs; James N. Drummond's Catalog of Philatelic Miscellany; and the notes of George Sloane and Gordon Stimmell.

Colors listed for stamps and forgeries are the opinions of the Farrell Collection based on viewing physical copies of the pieces under consistent lighting. Colors in the .pdfs may be slightly inaccurate due to manipulations from the scanning process, computer monitor settings, or (in event that the files are printed for offline viewing) the printing process.

Unless otherwise noted, stamps are identified by their Scott Catalogue numbers and forgeries are identified by their Lyons Identifier type. Scott numbers in parenthesis under listed forgeries represent approximately what stamp the forgery is attempting to imitate.

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This independent mail company was established by William Wyman. Wyman, previously an agent for Harnden Express Co., started his own company in around the end of July, 1844. Operating out of Harnden's offices, his mail route ran from Boston to New York.

LETTERS FOR NEW YORK.

THE undersigned takes this method to inform his friends and the public, that he has opened offices at No. 8 Court street, Boston, and 3 Wall street, New York, through which to transmit letters between the two cities, also between Boston and Lowell, at the tow rates of Postage, 20 stamps for \$1.

ADVERTISEMENT PUBLISHED IN THE BOSTON SEMI-WEEKLY ADVERTISER JULY 31, 1844

By September of the same year, he advertised that due to an increase in his facilities, he was able to forward letters to "nearly all the principal cities and villages in the United States where any of the independent mails are sent [...]".

Wyman's stamps, which feature the first image of a train on a denominated postage stamp, sold in sheets of 20 for \$1. The stamps were lithographed in black on white, wove paper. Two varieties exist, which are differentiated by a broken "W." in "W. Wyman."

Wyman also used a red, rectangular handstamp. It is noted that this handstamp rarely touched the stamps, which were usually cancelled by manuscript.

Only three examples of covers with Wyman stamps carried by Overton & Co. are known. This is a rare example of the Overton handstamp used as a cancel on a Wyman stamp.

George Hussey produced forgeries of the Wyman stamps using lithography.

Hussey's forgery (Forgery A) was printed in plates of ten, arranged as two columns of five subjects. At left is a reconstruction of this plate.

Some forgery A positions have clear variations. Positions one and two are easy to identify: position one has a comma after the first "W" instead of a period; position two has no period.

Jean-Baptiste Moens published an illustration of the Wyman's stamp in his collector's guidebook *Postage Stamps Illustrated*. Imitations of Moens's illustrations were later copied or lithographed by forgers to create counterfeits.


